Hello Fellow SEDRA Members and Distance Riders!

Looking back at my October, I realize what an adventure-packed month it has proved to be!

At the beginning of the month I was invited to join 2 other SEDRA Members for a 'have-fun only' horse trip to the Big South Fork area of Tennessee (with most of my hauling destinations being distance competitions, I forget sometimes that you can travel with your horse just 'for fun'!) Great trails, great weather and a great time with friends, and I learned a few things...for instance, 'manure' happens! Even with a brand new rig, we ended up on the shoulder of Interstate 75 in Perry, Georgia waiting for a tow truck to haul us back to Florida. Yup, truck AND horse trailer were towed south, and since the tow truck cab was a two-seater, my other friend and I traveled home in the living quarters of the horse trailer! I had always heard it was a good idea to have someone haul you around while inside the horse trailer so that you can get a feel for how to drive slowly and safely when towing your own horses...oh yeah...and you're not supposed to hang on to anything either! Well, I got a new appreciation for what my horses endure while traveling in an aluminum box with windows and wheels. It was noisy...the windows had to be open to let air circulate. It wasn't as smooth as riding in our vehicles, in fact it took a while to get used to the rougher ride and it was difficult to anticipate stops, turns, railroad tracks and accelerating when unable to see ahead down the road! I was constantly rebalancing, bracing, and reacting throughout the 6 hour drive, and add in the wind whistling around you and the clanging and banging of general road noise, and I'm just amazed my horses continue to load up time and again! I also did my own research study on 'Which is Better - Straight or Slant Load?' Without anything to steady me, I stood facing forward, then on a slant...(drum roll)...and the slant won out as I found it easier to balance in an angled stance!

I had a week to recover before heading out to the First Annual Withlacoochee 25 CTR and Drive. It was coined a 'Spooktacular Event' and rookie Ride Manager Chrissy Pool made it a Halloween themed ride complete with pumpkin shaped signs on trail. It had been a while since I had seen driving carts on trail; they were a terrific addition to the ride and all 3 drivers were able to finish despite the unusual heat and humidity! Congratulations to Chrissy and all of her able volunteers for a well-managed ride; I'm hoping that "First Annual" means we can all look forward to another FHA Fall ride next year!

I had another great ride experience with rookie Ride Manager Teri Hunter's new Florida Distance Classic 25/50 Endurance Ride the last weekend in October. Had I followed the weather forecast to the T, I might not have gone since it was supposed to rain all 3 days. Good thing I took a chance and went anyway because it didn't rain and the trails turned out to be flat, mostly double track and even dry for being located in a swamp. Also, a well marked trail with lots of water and eager volunteers made for a successful ride! The camping area was beautiful under the big oaks with electric hook ups and plentiful water spigots. Just as I arrived in camp I had a trailer wheel bearing that started screeching...again, 'manure' happens! Well, before the night was even over, a plan had hatched to 'Get Ruth Ann and Her Horse Home'...and I was the last one to be notified! With an empty trailer I was able to drive home on 3 of my 4 trailer tires while I followed another rider and her rig back to Jupiter where she safely delivered my horse! I just love the camaraderie at these rides, whether CTR or Endurance, and you can get any kind of support you may need... whether expert mechanical help, an endless variety of pharmaceutical samples, unique alcoholic concoctions, yummy gourmet treats, and I've even attended some mini-counseling sessions! All trails will remain open during all hunts, except as listed in the attached, revised 2007-8 Wilflife Harvest Guide. (The FWCC brochures listed general rules, subject to the local forestry district's option to close trails during hunts.) The Withlacoochee State Trail (a Florida state park) does not close during hunt seasons. FFBCH organizing effort to re-open horse trail on Withlacoochee State Trail - The horse trail on the Withlacoochee State Trail, our Rails to Trails (RTT) has been closed since the hurricane damage in 2004. Steve Stackhouse, Withlacoochee State Trail Manager says that the horse trail was not re-opened because there were no equestrians volunteering to help DEP reopen it. Steve says that all he needs are volunteers to show the interest in helping to re-open and maintain the horse trail for him to allocate some portion of his time, budget, and resources to maintaining the horse trail once again.

We have recently talked to many equestrians who say that they used to ride the RTT a lot before the storms. We have also talked to a number of people who say they are interested in helping to re-open the trail.

FFBCH is organizing a group of volunteers to re-open portions of the RTTs horse trail. Our thoughts are to start at Croom-Rital Road and work our way north to Nobleton, then from Croom-Rital Road south to Ridge Manor and then Nobleton to Floral City. Other sections can be done as well if there are interested volunteers.

We would like to make this as simple and as much fun as possible. It is going to be an ongoing job for a while so the plan is to schedule a workday once a week on a day and at a time that is convenient for those participating. We will work for an hour or two each time so that we don't overdo it. There are some big trees down and then there are long stretches that need just the overhead and brush cut back. We will tackle the long easy stretches first and have special work days with appropriate equipment to tackle the bigger trees. (Steve may help with that). We need volunteers with various skills and

capabilities; chain saw users, clippers, brush movers, litter collectors, drivers for vehicle/equipment, someone to pass out water....or if you just want to come out and cheer us on you are welcome to do that too.

Steve requires that each of us fill out a form for him. In return he will give us each a volunteer card to carry as we are working. I will have those forms available at each of the workdays.

We have a scheduled workday for Friday, **December 7, 2007**. We will meet at 10:00 am at RTT where it crosses Croom-Rital Road. Bring water, gloves, bug spray. If you have these items, bring clippers, small chain saw, long handle pole saw, lopers (two foot handle clippers), or anything else that might be easy to carry or useful. We have permission to drive on RTT so we will be able to move vehicles/equipment along as we work.

## PRESERVING OUR EQUINE HERITAGE ON PUBLIC LANDS ACT

Introduction - Many who enjoy recreational riding on public lands are concerned about the reduction of trails, trail heads and the closure of public lands to horses and pack animals. Access to areas to ride is one of the most important issues facing riders. To prevent further closures, recreational riders are working closely with their federal, state and local land managers and also looking for federal legislative solutions. Senate Legislation- On November 1, 2007, Senator Mike Crapo (R-ID) introduced the Preserving our Equine Heritage on Public Lands Act (S. 2238). Senator Crapo introduced similar legislation in the last Congress.

This bill recognizes the importance of saddle and pack stock in the settling, exploration and recreation of our country by ensuring that the horse's historic and traditional use is recognized as our public lands are managed by the National Park Service, the Bureau of Land Management, the United States Fish and Wildlife Service, and the Forest Service.

The bill directs the Secretaries of Interior and Agriculture to manage the federal lands under their jurisdiction "in a manner that preserves and facilitates the continued use and access of pack and saddle stock animals" on lands on which "there is a historical tradition" of use. The bill applies to the management of the National Park System, BLM lands, National Wildlife Refuge System land, and National Forest System land.

The bill provides that such lands "shall remain open and accessible to the use of pack and saddle stock animals" where there is a tradition of use, but does not limit the federal agencies' ultimate authority to restrict such use, provided the agencies perform the review required under the National Environmental Policy Act of 1969. The bill would also impose additional specific and designated procedures to be followed by agencies before any land closures to horses. These procedures include advance notice of any proposed reduction in use to allow public comment, convening a public meeting near the area involved, and collaboration with various users during the process.

The bill directs the Secretaries of the Interior and Agriculture to issue a policy within 180 days of enactment that defines the meaning of "historical tradition of the use of pack and saddle stock animals" on federal lands.

Congressional Action - The bill was referred to the Senate Committee on Energy and Natural Resources.

AHC Position - The AHC supports this legislation and asks all recreational riders to contact their Senators encouraging them to act on it in the Senate.

Where will you ride tomorrow? Rural areas with open space are experiencing unprecedented growth. Urban residents are choosing to build homes in rural areas to enjoy the perceived benefits provided by fields, forests and mountains. As more people move to the scenic countryside, the open space that attracts these new residents is increasingly at risk.

Undeveloped land provides clean water, wood and agricultural products, and is absolutely essential to all equestrian activities. Over the last two decades, the U.S. has lost 6,000 acres per day, or 250 acres per hour; 4 acres per minute of open space. Unless this trend is slowed, there will be nowhere to raise the hay and grain horses require, no pasture for horses and nowhere to ride. It's time to start shouting the message from the roofs of stables and the center of riding rings all around the country.

"Land use and land conservation are the most important issues facing horse owners of the 21st century," says John Strassburger, former editor of the Chronicle of the Horse. "If you have ridden or owned a horse for more than a decade, you can think of places that you used to ride that have been transformed into houses or malls, barns that have closed as suburbia surrounded them, competitions that were forced to move because their showgrounds were sold, or foxhunts that kept moving their territory farther and farther away."

**So what can you do?** Your concern is the start. The single biggest thing anyone who owns land can do is to donate a permanent conservation easement on it. A conservation easement is a contract that limits the use of the land, forever. In exchange for giving up development rights, landowners can take significant reductions in real-estate and income taxes. Not everyone can donate an easement, but you can become a member of, and volunteer for, organizations that are working hard to preserve the countryside.

The Equestrian Land Conservation Resource (ELCR) is the only national organization dedicated to saving equestrian land. ELCR is celebrating its 10th anniversary, and your recognition of the fight to save land for horses would be a great present. www.elcr.org

## Breed Registry News...Missouri Fox Trotters - Mileage Program for SEDRA Distance Nominated

**Horses-** Distance Program to recognize Missouri Fox Trotters competing in the South Eastern Distance Rider Association (SEDRA) competitions.

The Association tracks SEDRA mileage and rewards horses enrolled in the MFTHBA GO the Distance Mileage Program with mileage awards, and recognition in The Journal, MFTHBA welcomes the addition of SEDRA riders to our program and thanks them for showcasing the abilities of Missouri Fox Trotters on the Trail.

This program is designed to encourage and reward the breeding and competing of sound, sensible, athletic horses, the distance program uses SEDRA and NATRC mileage as the criteria to recognize superior equine athletes. SEDRA Competitive Trail Ride/Drive competitions usually require a horse to cover between 25-40 miles in a one day period, 50 miles over a two day period and 100 miles in a three day at a prescribed speed/with in a certain time period. During this time, the horse is examined by a certified veterinarian judge several times to evaluate condition and soundness as well as manners and the ability to maneuver trail obstacles.

Upon enrollment, each owner receives a trail decal with the Distance Program logo. When the horse reaches 250 miles, a cap with the logo on it is awarded. 500 miles receives a jacket with the right to customize it with various options including the horse's name and mileage achievement.

Participation in the program requires the ride of the horse to be a member of the MFTHBA and the horse to be registered with the Association. Mileage is counted only after enrollment in the program. The enrollment fee of \$25 enrolls the horse for life. The enrollment will follow the horse, not the rider, and is transferable if the horse is sold.

In order to simplify tracking of mileage, each rider or owner must submit a copy of the horse's judge card upon completion of the SEDRA ride to the MFTHBA office in Ava, MO. If the horse completed the entire ride and was not pulled, full SEDRA mileage will be credited to the horse. If the

ride is a multi-day competition, the horse must complete all days to receive any mileage. Riders or owners are encouraged to track their own mileage for verification purposes. Visit <a href="www.mfthba.com">www.mfthba.com</a> for information regarding the "Go The Distance Program"!
