- Trans-Tasman series occurs annually between Australia and New Zealand
- A tri-nations series between Australia, New Zealand and Malaysia

The Sport

- World wide growth in Endurance
- Increasing value of horses benefiting all
- Dedicated training stables
- Professional trainers & riders
- Higher standards of nutrition, training and veterinary involvement
- International trade in horses
- High profile national & international events and a high profile for the sport within the equestrian sports

The Sport

- Faster events with prizes and prestige for the successful competitors
- Need for professional officials especially veterinarians
- Need for specialized treatment veterinarians
- Faster speeds with lower completion rates
- High consumption rate of horses to fill the needs of the sport
- High demand for young horses to qualify
- Pressure on horse welfare

The Competition

- It is a standard for championship events
- Held in weather conditions and on a suitable track that is conducive to the welfare of the horse and good competition
- Team competition must remain an essential part of endurance championships

The Competition

- Qualifications for championships need to be reviewed
 - It is time for nations to qualify for WC as in other disciplines on a fair and equitable basis Best riders on the best horses competing Raising the standard of the event and image of sport
 - Promoting horse welfare Financially viable for host nations


Course Conditions

- Need to rate courses according to level of technical difficulty, taking into account terrain, weather conditions.
- Set track standards
- Appropriate training for course designers.



Officials

- Training of veterinarians should be ongoing, monitored by National Federations and better training aids (video etc)
- Develop a process for loss of veterinary /Official accreditation
- Conflict of interests clearly defined wrt clients and patients




Officials-Veterinarians

- 3 veterinarians required to vote on every elimination at 3 & 4 star events – i.e. metabolic, lameness, injury
- Final veterinary examination at rides needs be streamlined



Officials

- Two hour invasive tmt rule hard to police without an examination
- CRI has different interpretations in different countries and needs to be re-examined
- Foreign veterinary delegate report needs to be reviewed for relevancy



Officials- TD & Ground Jury

- Recommend a training programme for ride organisers
- Standard of performance of officials varies from country to country
- Integrity of the custody of veterinarians' voting slips not guaranteed
- Conflict of interest issues have to be clarified i.e. family and horses competing



Officials

- TD report to be reviewed to reflect the role of the TD
- Rules are interpreted differently in different countries
- Guideline for the supervision of endurance events for all officials be published and be the basis of for training
- Decisions making process transparent and with integrity








- Published ride results do not accurately tell the story of the ride i.e. eliminations, withdrawals and treatments
- Ratio of lameness to metabolic eliminations is a superficial but reasonable measure
- Australia Ratio 7 to 1


What data is being collected? Who is monitoring the trends? Are we confident that low completion rates are acceptable?



- Treatment veterinarian should examine all eliminations & withdrawals at 3 & 4 star events & report findings
- Re-establish veterinary advisory committee to assess elimination statistics and report on trends based on factual data

- Develop a user friendly computer programme for the running of the event & to produce BC & ride results
- BC form be changed to eliminate the influence of the final presentation time
- When should a ride be abandoned?
 - Fatalities
 - Hospital overflowing
 - Weather conditions
 - Alternative Plan with track?
 - Indefinite hold?

- Course for Endurance Treatment Veterinarians
- Very specialised area of expertise
- Be part of FEI course for Veterinarians
